



Miami-Dade County Public Schools Receives \$15 Million Grant

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Miami-Dade County Public Schools has been awarded a \$15 million grant by the U.S. Department of Education's Magnet Schools Assistance Program (MSAP). M-DCPS was selected as one of 19 recipients nationwide in a competitive process to fund three new K-8 schoolwide magnet program. The M-DCPS will re-envision two existing K-8 centers, Thomas Jefferson Biscayne Gardens K-8 Academy and Bowman Foster Ashe/Doolin K-8 Academy, and re-imagine Citrus Grove Elementary and Citrus Grove Middle schools into a new K-8 center.

Each K-8 STArts² Project school will engage students in Science, Technology, and the Arts, Exploration and Innovation with a focus on Digital Music Production. STArts² is designed to increase academic rigor, inspire interest in Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics (STEAM) careers, and promote higher academic achievement by creating a fully inclusive schoolwide magnet which will serve all boundary and magnet applicant students in grades K-8 without distinction.

The project will nurture 21st century skills development through classroom interaction, remote and/or blended learning collaboration, and experiential place-based learning opportunities. Authentic and collaborative learning will be facilitated by applying research-based instructional practices that engage students in hands-on and place-based learning at partner-sites to enrich the value of STEAM education for students and foster an early foundation of interest in STEAM careers.

Project partners include Fairchild Tropical Botanic Gardens; Florida International University; Amazon Web Services; International Process Service (music production consultants); and Discovery Education.

Successful programs tend to be run over multiple weeks in the summer, bring in at least 20 students with mathematical interests, and generally are directed by mathematicians. Funding is for one year, and half of the funds are expected to be used for student scholarships and a half for program expenses. No indirect costs will be covered. To be eligible, programs must have existed for at least one year, preferably longer.

TEACH Grant

The TEACH Grant Program provides grants of up to \$4,000 a year to students who are completing or plan to complete course work needed to begin a career in teaching.

A TEACH Grant-eligible program is a program of study that is designed to prepare you to teach as a highly qualified teacher in a high-need field and that leads to a bachelor's or master's degree or is a postbaccalaureate program. A two-year program that is acceptable for full credit toward a bachelor's degree is considered a program that leads to a bachelor's degree. A postbaccalaureate program is not TEACH-Grant-eligible if it is offered by a school that also offers a bachelor's degree in education.

Schools that participate in the TEACH Grant Program determine which of the programs they offer are TEACH-Grant-eligible. A program that is TEACH-Grant-eligible at one school might not be TEACH-Grant-eligible at another school. Additionally, even

if a program meets the eligibility requirements to be a TEACH-Grant-eligible program, it may not be designated as TEACH-Grant-eligible by the school. Contact the financial aid office at the school you are attending (or that you plan to attend) to find out which programs at that school are eligible.
