Miami-Dade County Public Schools Awarded \$70,000 to Support Healthier and More Efficient School Operations

The Go Green Initiative and Florida Beverage Association awarded Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) \$70,000 to support the advancement of environmental health, safety, and sustainability in schools. Led by Resource Efficiency Officer, Karly Pulido and her team in collaboration with the Office of Grants Administration prepared and processed two separate grant applications to champion Green Initiatives in schools throughout the district.

- Go Green Initiative's Clean Indoor Air Initiative is a multi-year program that provides approximately \$45,000 in incentive-based funding. The grant is designed to help school districts improve indoor air quality and building efficiency. The program is supported by the Go Green Initiative and funded wholly or in part by the United States Environmental Protection Agency.
- 2026 Florida Beverage Association Community Grant for \$25,000, will expand recycling infrastructure across schools participating in the Green Schools Recognition Program during the 2026–2027 school year. M-DCPS was selected from more than 140 applicants, and the award is made possible through a partnership between the Florida Beverage Association and the American Beverage Foundation for a Healthy America, with each organization contributing \$12,500.

“We have the opportunity and the responsibility to make an impact and prepare young adults to care for their surroundings and build strong, resilient communities,” said Karly Pulido. “Our Green Initiatives gives them the experience to do just that and these grants help us to reinforce and expand our efforts,” she concluded.

Showcase of 2025-2026 M-DCPS Foundation Mini-Grant winners continues with: Booker T. Washington Sr., Eneida M. Hartner Elementary, and Winston Park K-8 Center



Booker T. Washington - An "A" rated school by the state of Florida! We believe that education extends beyond the classroom. Through our extensive extracurricular programs, community partnerships, and commitment to character development, we aim to cultivate responsible, compassionate, and engaged citizens.

Winston Park K-8 Center - An "A" rated school by the state of Florida! Our school's success is a direct reflection of the hard work and dedication of our students, staff, and our incredible families. We are especially excited to share that we increased our score by an amazing 3% from the previous year. This year we celebrate our school's 50th anniversary! To honor this incredible milestone, our theme for the year is: "50 Years Strong. One School. One Family." This theme perfectly captures the spirit of our community—a place where everyone feels a sense of belonging and support.

2025 M-DCPS Mini Grant Winner: Booker T. Washington

The Booker T. Washington Band Program serves students in grades 9-12, whose access to musical instruments and quality arts education is extremely limited due to challenging historic socio-economic barriers. Many students enter the program never having held an instrument or received formal music instruction. Despite this, the school band continues to excel, serving as a powerful community unifier and outlet for youth coping with economic hardship.

The *Breaking Barriers* grant application described an initiative aimed to support the Booker T. Washington Band Program and uplift underserved youth by providing equitable access to music education and performance opportunities to its students. “It has been a success thus far! With the purchase and repair of instruments the band’s enrollment increased by 80%!” stated Mr. Newbold. “Students were able to actively participate in their annual Music Performance Assessments where a record number 55 students participate and the vast majority of students earned a SUPERIOR rating which is the highest rating a student can earn,” he continued.

Breaking Barriers program not only meets a critical cultural and educational gap, it helps create viable pathways to scholarships and higher education for students who may otherwise have limited access. “This would not have been possible without the Mini Grant. We are so grateful!” he concluded.

2025 M-DCPS Mini Grant Winner: Eneida M. Hartner Elementary



Eneida M. Hartner Elementary School serves over 300 students grades PK through 5th grade, where building its students' foundational reading skills is essential to preparing them to become fluent readers by third grade. "At Eneida Hartner Elementary School, we're implementing a fun initiative in our primary grade classes which aims to promote explicit instruction and progress monitoring of phonics skills," said Dr. Anailen Marban, Assistant Principal. She explained that the Reading Race has homeroom classes participate in biweekly reading races, comprised of short phonics quizzes, whereas the goal is for the majority of students (80%) to demonstrate mastery of the targeted skills. During the Reading Races, members of the pit crew (leadership team) visit classrooms to administer and score the quizzes. Unmastered skills are assessed during subsequent races until most of the group (80%) has achieved mastery. Results of grade level races are posted and announced following each race.

"We began implementing our project in September of 2025. Members of the leadership team visited classrooms to introduce students to the Reading Race and get them excited about the initiative," said Dr. Marban. "This year, thanks to the generosity of M-DCPS Foundation, we have purchased manipulatives for our primary grade teachers to enhance how phonics skills are reinforced," she continued. Results of recent I-Ready Reading AP2 diagnostic has shown notable growth among grade K-2 students' phonemic awareness and phonics domain. Dr. Marban looks forward to continuing to help students become strong fluent readers.

WHO WAS: Eneida Massas Hartner (February 12, 1943-February 19, 1989) was born in San Lorenzo, Puerto Rico and at 6 years of age her father found work in the steel mills of Gary, Indiana and moved the family. In the early 1960s, she worked as a school secretary while taking college classes. She graduated with degrees in education and Spanish literature and started teaching Spanish to high school students in Indiana. In 1970, she and her husband Roger moved to Miami. Mrs. Hartner began developing programs for M-DCPS bilingual education department. When M-DCPS began a pilot program for bilingual education, Mrs. Hartner wrote Spanish curricula for elementary schools and traveled the country, training other teachers. The bilingual curricula she first developed for elementary schools in M-DCPS was later implemented in other states. Later she served as the first female Puerto Rican principal at Buena Vista Elementary (1978-1980).

2025 M-DCPS Mini Grant Winner: Winston Park K-8 Center

Winston Park K-8 Center (WPK8) is a Title I school, with student achievement data often outpacing schools with similar demographics. It was named an ECTAC Exceeding Expectations Award School in 2025 for its progress in improving student achievement for ALL students. Given the academic success of its students, the school is always exploring opportunities to expand and deepen student learning through project-based experiences.

WPK8 has been a Miami-Dade County Public School's S.T.E.A.M. designated school for the past decade. This rigorous accreditation process requires significant investment from staff in time, preparation and material. Given the budget constraints of being a K-8 Center, the school does not always have enough funding for supplies to ensure the realization of the STEAM projects created by its teachers.

“We are thrilled to announce that thanks to the generous grant funds, our elementary and middle school Sphero teams are now fully equipped with brand-new tablets and invention kits,” said Ms. Marlene Llama-Almaguer, school grant lead. The project was set in motion on the first day of school, integrating seamlessly into course electives and after-school care meetings. By providing students with consistent access to high-quality robotics hardware, an environment where coding and engineering challenges have become second nature. “The impact of this technology is evident in our students’ newfound confidence as they navigate complex programming tasks and engage in collaborative problem-solving,” she continued.

The results of this implementation include the elementary team demonstrating incredible skill at the M-DCPS State Competition and securing a highly impressive 4th place in February. The middle school team was awarded first place at Sphero Regional Invitational in December, going on to win the M-DCPS State Championship! The team will now be representing M-DCPS at the Sphero World Competition. “The students’ response has been a mix of pure excitement and dedicated focus, proving that when given the right tools, their potential is limitless,” Ms. Llama-Almaguer concluded.

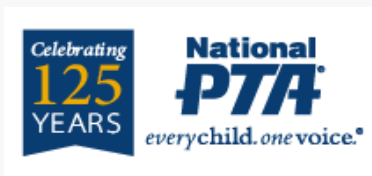
Fall 2026 National PTA Program

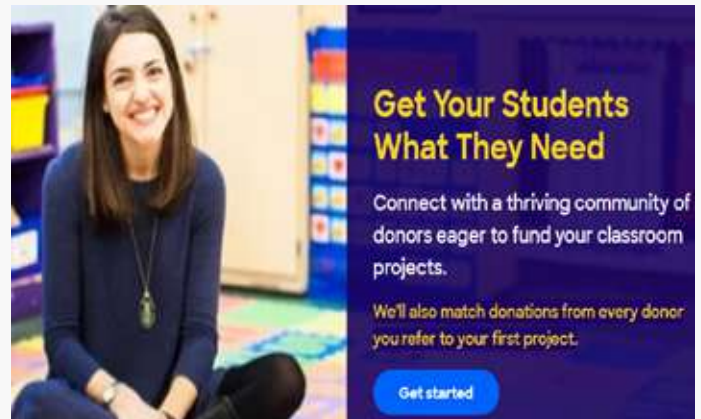

TEACH Grant

The TEACH Grant Program provides grants of up to \$4,000 a year to students who are completing or plan to complete course work needed to begin a career in teaching. A TEACH Grant-eligible program is a program of study that is designed to prepare you to teach as a highly qualified teacher in a high-need field and that leads to a bachelor's or master's degree or is a postbaccalaureate program. A two-year program that is acceptable for full credit toward a bachelor's degree is considered a program that leads to a bachelor's degree. A postbaccalaureate program is not TEACH-Grant-eligible if it is offered by a school that also offers a bachelor's degree in education. Schools that participate in the TEACH Grant Program determine which of the programs they offer are TEACH-Grant-eligible. A program that is TEACH-Grant-eligible at one school might not be TEACH-Grant-eligible at another school. Additionally, even if a program meets the eligibility requirements to be a TEACH-Grant-eligible program, it may not be designated as TEACH-Grant-eligible by the school. Contact the financial aid office at the school you are attending (or that you plan to attend) to find out which programs at that school are eligible.

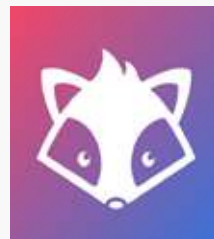
